According to the speaker the objection on the part of China were that the Japanese were making which he threw up for protection and efforts to civilize Corea and raise that country to a higher state of Christianity. A dispute followed and Chinese troops were dispatched to the scene of the trouble. The principle battles, the hardships of the troops and their humanity toward their enemies and the crulities of the Chines: troops to the Japanese troops were fully brought out.
