These pictures will give an insight into the industrial, economic, educational and religious conditions of the peoples of the Philippine Islands, China and Japan.

Mr. Austin will deliver this lecture throughout the second district. This tour is to be made for the purpose of bringing to his constituents some of the things which he saw, heard and felt while in the Orient. He has writen series of articles telling of industrial, economic and political conditions of the oriental lands, and these have been given wide publicity in the leading dailies and magazines of the east.

> Will you place numerals over your doors and install receptacles, so that Maryville can get free mail delivery?

> If you do not, the Board of Trade will do this for you. At its meeting last Thursday night, \$50 was appropriated for this purpose, and inspection of houses will be made and where citizens refuse or decline to put up numerals and receptacles, the board will have them placed.

Maryville cannot get free mail delivery until these requirements are met. This may be the last opportunity for several years of getting free delivery, and thus the Board of Trade is going to qualify for the service. Numerals and receptacles cost only a small amount, and every one who is able to own or rent a house is able to buy these, if they will.

An inspector will make a final visit to Maryville in a few days, and will report either favorably the Tuckaleechee pike will be or unfavorably as to free delivery. If numerals and receptacles are not found at every house, he will report unfavorably, and it will probably be several years before this delivery opportunity again comes to Maryville.

water at small outlay. Up to this time we (my wife and I) water with buckets from a spring in the county's school buildings, smaller than this one, grew on down a small hill about four rods away. It was my practice to bring two 14-quart buckets morning and noon, and what was needed at night. This was quite a when a man comes in from the fields hot and tired.
